





# Almost Anything Can Be a Poison

- •A poison is any product or substance that can harm someone if it is used in the wrong way, by the wrong person, or in the wrong amount.
- The dose makes the poison



# Almost Anything Can Be a Poison

#### •5R's of Medication Safety

- Right drug
- Right dose
- Right route
- Right patient
- Right time

# If you think someone has been poisoned...

- Call poison control <u>1-800-222-1222</u> right away
- Do not wait for the person to look or feel sick
- Do not try to treat the person yourself
- If someone is unconscious or not breathing, call 911

# Poisonings can happen to anyone.

Just under half of calls to poison control centers are about children—but poisonings in teens, adults, and older adults are usually more serious.



#### **MOST COMMON POISON EXPOSURES:**

#### **YOUNG CHILDREN**

- Cosmetics & personal care products
- Household cleaners
- Pain medicines

#### **TWEENS & TEENS**

- Pain medicines
- Antidepressants
- Foreign bodies & toys (ages 6-12)

#### **ADULTS**

- Pain medicines
- Sleep medicines
   & anxiety/mood medicines
- Antidepressants

#### **OLDER ADULTS**

- Heart medicines
- Pain medicines
- Sleep medicines
   & anxiety/mood medicines

Other common poison exposures include: household products, plants, mushrooms, pesticides, bites & stings, and carbon monoxide.

### Poison Prevention



# Store potential poisons out of reach of children and pets

- Upper cabinets
- Cabinets with child locks
- In a locked room
- In locked box or other secure storage area
- In their original labeled containers



#### Potential poisons

- Household cleaners
- Batteries
- Perfume
- Lawn chemicals
- Gasoline
- Antifreeze
- Medications
- Vitamins

### Unused or Expired Medication Disposal

- DO NOT FLUSH medications down the toilet
- Take medications to a drug disposal box
  - Located inside Albertson's in Sherman
  - Located inside the Sherman Police Department
- Take medications to a Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA)Take Back Event
  - Occurs every October and April

# How does Naloxone work?



Knocks the opioid off the receptor

No Opioid = No Effect



Quickly Restores Breathing

Usually Effective in 1 to 3 minutes
May last 30 to 90 minutes




#### Safe


Cannot be used to get high

Not harmful if the person receiving naloxone does not have opioids in their system





# Steps for using Naloxone



Administer nasal spray\*

Call 911

Keep person awake

Lay person on their side

Remain with them until help arrives

\*The 1 before 911

# Time is critical





4 minutes

Average time to brain damage after breathing stops



7 minutes

# Who is at greatest Risk for accidental drug Poisoning

- Having recently been in jail or drug treatment program
- Using IV Drugs
- Taking high dose prescription opioids pain
- Taking anti-anxiety meds or sleeping pills plus opioids
- Taking alcohol plus opioids

- Taking opioids when you have other chronic health conditions
  - COPD
  - Sleep Apnea
  - Dementia
  - Kidney Disease
  - Liver Disease
  - Schizophrenia



# Who needs a kit?

#### **EVERYONE**

- Anyone with opioids in the home
- Anyone who takes opioids
- Anyone with a history substance use disorder
- Anyone who has experienced accidental opioid poisoning in the past
- Anyone who uses recreational drugs
- Anyone who uses IV drugs
- Anyone who may be in a position to help someone suffering from drug poisoning

# Where to get Narcan

#### Local Pharmacies

- Most can dispense naloxone kits
- Request a kit from your pharmacist
- Many insurances will cover naloxone kits
- Available in a generic
- Now available over-the-counter

#### **Grant Program for Texas**

- www.morenarcanplease.com
- Fill out the online request
- Receive 1 free kit in the mail
- Repeat requests are accepted as the supply allows

# Poison Prevention Tips

#### Adults

- Store medications in original packaging
- Store medications in a secure location
- Limit the number of people who know where your medications are stored
- Do NOT share medications
- Dispose of unused or expired medications

#### Kids

- Never share your medicine with someone else
- Never use someone else's medicine
- Read and follow the label every time you take medication
- Only take medicine under the guidance of your parent or guardian

# Drug DISPOSAL

#### **Drug Collection Sites**

- Visit the DEA Website to search for permanent collection sites

#### **At-Home Disposal Kits**

- Dispose Rx
  - Add Powder packet and water to vial to inactivate pills
  - Safe for disposal in household trash with this method
  - Available for purchase at local pharmacies
